Most members minimize the number of items they carry on visits and should something happen to you, it would be helpful for those who come to your aid to be able to contact someone who is familiar with you and your pet, as quickly as possible. In those rare instances an ICE number may be needed, it will be easily found on our new ID cards, coming in 2019. When

your membership renewal arrives next year, please consider providing an ICE number to give you, and your pet, peace of mind.

New ID Cards

If you renew by mail, we will ask you to email a photo of yourself to info@loveonaleash.org (similar to the process you used when you submitted your new membership application).

In addition, we have also allocated space on the new card for an "In Case of Emergency" (I.C.E.) contact telephone number. When you renew your membership, you will be given the option to add this number, and it will be printed on your new ID card. Having this I.C.E. number on your ID Card is not required, however as noted above, the Board feels that it could prove useful under certain circumstances.



Lear Spotlight: Capitol Area - MI

Eagle, MI – About one year ago, Love on a Leash welcomed the Capitol Area - MI chapter, and newly certified member **Cady Ness-Smith** knew immediately that she wanted to establish an LOAL chapter in her area. "There were many people interested in therapy dog work, but were looking for more support and supervision than other therapy pet organizations were offering their members. Many had been members of other therapy dog organizations in the past, as had I."

The chapter began with 4 teams back in October 2017. "Two of us were AKC CGC evaluators and two of us had experience with therapy pets from other organizations," Cady recalls, "I worked with facilities that I knew, to assist in the supervision of our teams. I also reached out to the LOAL chapter in eastern Michigan for support and suggestions as we went through the process."

Today, the chapter has grown to 39 teams, and interest continues to grow. Teams visit as large

groups at community events, Michigan State University, and Lansing Community College. They also visit in smaller groups at assisted living rehab facilities, hospitals, schools, libraries, etc. Some teams also visit individually at established facilities, and the chapter has even responded to community crisis situations when called upon.

Cady volunteers to do community education programs to help promote LOAL at health fairs and other community events. "One of the things our chapter does is get home addresses of all members, so we can better market to facilities that are close to where teams live. Teams are more open to visiting on a regular basis, if it is convenient to get to a location and fits their lifestyle," Cady has observed. "We have teams that visit weekly, twice monthly, or even monthly. On the other hand, we have some teams that visit more than one facility weekly."

The chapter arranged an LOAL picnic in September, inviting the other two Michigan LOAL chapters and any teams that were not currently members of a chapter. The picnic was held in Fenton, MI; a central location. There were games for the dogs and handlers, and prizes to be won. The chapter plans to repeat the event next year.

Capitol Area currently has two cats working on supervised visits at this time. When asked if there are any unique teams in her chapter, Cady replied, "We have many unique teams: **Tasha** is a career changed Paws with a Cause service dog. **River** is a career changed Leader Dog candidate. **Farkle** is an AKC trick dog champion. **Cam** is an AKC Grand Champion and paints with his paws. **Toes** has several AKC therapy dog titles and has earned all three Dog Scout Therapy dog badges. **Lassie** is actually related to the famous TV and movie Lassie! Many of our teams are also involved in Dog Scouts, so are involved in community service projects, such as volunteering at shelters, fostering dogs, training dogs, and volunteering to teach and assist in dog training classes in the community. Two of our handlers volunteer for Paws with a Cause."

What is Cady's favorite aspect about volunteering for Love on a Leash? "Allowing others to enjoy the love and affection of our therapy pets. To see the joy and watch them interact with our pets is magic." Thank you Cady for your chapter's passion and dedication.

Schools Benefit from Therapy Visits

Swansboro, NC – The voice of a Swansboro Middle School student rises from a group gathered around a visitor to campus and sums up the reason Kaia, a 2-year-old standard poodle, was there: 'This dog makes me happy.'

Kaia and **Thor**, a 4-year-old golden retriever, stopped by for the last day of endof-grade testing at this middle school, and are two of four Love on a Leash therapy teams that have visited during the school's testing period. They have been invited to help ease the anxiety of students as they head into class.

The school's Admin team agrees that it seems to be working, "Their presence brings a smile to everyone's faces and that is what we want to see," Assistant Principal Tyndall observed. "Their morale is higher," added the school's occupational therapy assistant.

"Sometimes you can be having a bad day, but when you come to school and see her, it makes you feel better. She's so cute. She makes me happy," said sixth grader Erin, who stopped to pet Kaia.

Kaia's owner, **Brenda Wallace** (who became a LOAL member this past January), knows how testing can raise anxiety. "I'm a retired educator and I know the stress it can cause staff and students and this is something I was interested in doing."

Wallace greeted students along with Kaia, offering a 'Have a nice day' as students

strolled by with a wave or a pet on the head for Kaia.

"I've had kids tell me 'You made my day' or 'This is the best day ever.' They really seem to like the dogs being here," she said.

Other members of the chapter, Thor's owner **Donna Williams** (member since 2017), **Rosey Ward** (member since 2015) and her 7-year-old greyhound/lab mix, **Cali**, and **Carol Poe** (member since 2016) and her 4-year-old Australian Labradoodle, **Mocha**, have also visited Swansboro Middle during testing periods.

Increasingly, schools have been reaching out to pet therapy organizations, such as Love on a Leash, to ease stress during testing periods. Colleges began this trend a few years ago, but with schools focusing more and more on student social and emotional wellness, we are beginning to see an uptick in visit requests from both high schools and middle schools also.

Giving Back

Columbia X-Rds, PA – When people experience a tragic event and receive help from individuals or community, many give back in some way to show their appreciation.

But it's not just people who give back after experiencing a traumatic time in life – animals do, too. In our community there is a rescued dog that is now giving back.

Six years ago, **Newton**, a Chocolate Lab / Shar Pei, was one of 30 dogs and three cats rescued after being left abandoned in a second floor apartment in Jamestown, NY. No one knows how long the animals were there without human care.

After almost a year going from one shelter to another, Newton ended up at Animal Care Sanctuary (ACS) in East Smithfield. He was considered difficult to adopt because he had a loud rough sounding bark and usually barked when anyone came by the kennel to see the dogs.

But in February 2012, Newton was adopted and found his forever home. And after settling in, he proved himself to be a very quiet, calm and loving dog, only barking when someone came to the door – the perfect watchdog. But Newton was

also a good companion and very quickly became part of the family. He especially loved to ride in the car.

Last spring, ACS offered a behavior class for dogs that focused on the types of training helpful in therapy pet work, such as with Love On A Leash (LOAL).

"ACS is so excited to have classes for therapy dogs and cats," said Joan Smith-Reese, ACS director. "The response from the community is overwhelming and we are anxious to share their love and compassion with those that are lonely, infirm or just in need of a hug by a furry friend."

Newton's owner thought that because he was such a calm, loving dog, he would be a perfect therapy dog.

When they saw Einstein, they were lifted to happier times of family get-togethers at Einstein's former home with *Jerome* and his wife *Addie**.

"Look! He remembers you! He was always such a good dog! He was always *Addie*'s dog, wasn't he? Oh, we miss him! Look how handsome he is! He's going to give you a kiss!"

For 15 minutes they fawned all over him. He worked his way around to each of the eight people in the group, putting his head in their hands and gazing into their eyes.

Doug has stayed in touch with *Addie* since he adopted Einstein, sending her occasional photos and stories about their dog as a way to ease the pain he knew they felt when they gave him up. This time, the story reached them from family. It had to be a special solace for *Jerome* and *Addie* when the dog they raised had returned to help their family in a time of crisis.



"Hello.

My name is Barbara Wissink. I recently had an encounter with Love On A Leash that profoundly touched my life. My Mother passed away at 6:13 AM this past Saturday. Several hours before she died two dogs came into her hospital room to comfort her, and us as well. One dog, named **Jack**, had an extra special impact on my Mom.

I suppose a bit of back ground information on my Mom would help to clarify this story. Mom had approximately 50 stray dogs she fed every day on her mail route. She carried large sacks of dog food and treats with her every single day. The stray dogs came to recognize the sound of her mail truck and they came daily to receive a meal from her loving hands. She was so touched by their plight that she was known to take a few dogs home with her. One time she spent over \$1,000 to help provide needed medical care for a starving little dog she found in an old tire along the road who needed to have an injured eye removed. She had that dog for years

afterwards as a permanent member of the family. It was so fitting for God in His sovereignty to send her a fur covered angel to comfort her before she walked into eternity.

When Jack arrived in my Mom's room he immediately was placed on Mom's bed next to her. Then he tenderly placed his head on the exact spot where her cancerous tumor was growing in her abdomen and looked at her with kind loving eyes. It was almost as if he wanted to say, "If I could I'd soak up all your pain and take it away." He also placed his head on her heart and looked at her, occasionally licking her cheek. My Mom was not able to speak at this point, but as soon as Jack arrived and crawled up next to her, she kept repeating "Oh, Oh, Oh!" over and over.

It was a magical moment for all of us. I took pictures and recorded a brief video of the whole event which I will cherish for the rest of my life. Jack spent about 45 minutes lovingly encouraging my Mom and then had to go and encourage others who needed him. I was able to acquire his business card which I will use to send a thank you note and a large bag of duck jerky (Jack's favorite treat) to Jack and his owner, **Toni Perez**. Also, I plan on becoming involved with LOAL some day myself. I work for a local hospital and would like to start an LOAL chapter in my area.

Thanks for all you do. You and Jack have permanently touched my family's life with your kindness. I can't wait to pass this on and get this work going here!
