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### From the Board

# Are you or have you ever considered becoming a Visit Captain or a Supervisor for new Teams in Training?

If so, this article is for you! Firstly, let me say how indispensable these two roles are and how much our organization appreciates certified teams who volunteer beyond their own visits to fill these very important roles. More likely than not, you are helping Teams in Training who are being exposed to pet therapy for the first time and they are looking to you for guidance.

#### **Membership Guidelines**

As much as we ask and hope that each team has read the entire Membership Guidelines, we know that most only give them a quick scan. However, this does not absolve each handler from their responsibility to fully understand and follow our Guidelines. Both the applications for Dogs and Cats or Rabbits contain an Owner/Handler Agreement that must be initialed (not checked) in order to certify successfully. Additionally, each year when you renew your certification, that same agreement must be acknowledged once again. There are three (3) bulleted points in the Owner/Handler Agreement that pertain to our Membership Guidelines.

- I agree that if I do not or cannot abide by Love on a Leash® policies, procedures, and guidelines (including any revisions), my membership may be terminated at the discretion of the Love on a Leash® Board of Directors.
- I have read and agree to abide by the Owner/Handler Agreement.

I have read the Membership Guidelines (available on the Love on a Leash® website).

> By helping ensure that a Team in Training is a good fit, you are also reinforcing our organization's policies and procedures. It is important that you are

familiar with the Membership Guidelines so you can guide new teams effectively and help keep everyone on the same page. Any handler has the right to educate a team who is not following correct protocol. Our Membership Guidelines are there to keep us safe and protected.

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### From The Board (continued)

#### **Supervised Visits Log**

We have a favor to ask all our supervisors. Please be sure to enter the information requested in each box of the Supervised Visit Log. There is an example at the top of the log table. Please be sure the dates are in <u>chronological order</u>. If a date is logged out of order or is illegible, the Membership Team has no choice but to send emails and make phone calls to find out why. If a visit is 60 minutes long, then write in 60m or 1 hr – do not enter a check mark. While most visits are 60 minutes, some may be shorter, so it's important to verify the length of each visit. Incomplete or difficult to read information unnecessarily slows down the application review process.

#### Location, location, location

The biggest issue we see with almost every application that arrives is the vagueness of the locations where the visits take place. The Supervised Visits Log asks for the name of the facility (e.g. Meadows Retirement Home). Entering abbreviations or partial titles, such as CBTS, BGC, or Ivey, puts our Membership Team in a difficult position, as they cannot deduce what type of supervised visit was logged. In addition, even when the entire name is listed, it may still be difficult to figure out the type of visit logged. For example, Laguna Estates is the full name of a facility some of our teams visit, but what type of facility is it? Instead teams or supervisors should write in — at least for one of the visits if they visit more than once — Laguna Estates Senior Living or Laguna Estates Hospice Care, etc.

Love on a Leash® has certified volunteers in almost every state visiting thousands of locations. If we can receive more precise and complete location details upfront, it will help speed up the entire approval process. The clearer the information provided, the faster we can process applications, and the more efficiently we can serve all our teams.

When location information is incomplete or unclear, it takes a significant amount of time to track down details and accurately document them in the applicant's log. That means emails and phone calls. These extra steps slow down the entire application review process not only for the application in question, but also for any other applications that are waiting to be reviewed.

We are very aware that there is not much room to write

comments, a full location name, and the type of supervised visit. Feel free to to use the back of the page for additional notes, as suggested on the application. Some of our Visit Captains and

supervisors are already doing this and these few additional notes have been a tremendous help to a grateful Membership Team. Please endeavor to make the

certification process smoother for those teams in training who are eagerly awaiting their Welcome Packets as you once did.



One last request. Most of our supervisors already do this, but a reminder to please be sure to **print and sign** your names under the Supervisor's Name column. We have seen initials, printed names <u>or</u> signatures (which are largely illegible). Initials are never acceptable. By printing <u>and</u> signing your name, we are better equipped to quickly see who supervised each visit. It is important to remember that our applications are **legal documents**. Should an incident occur that results in a claim, the application would be subpoenaed as a legally binding document. We all hope this never happens, but it is the Membership Team's duty to make sure every application is completed correctly to prepare for that unlikely eventuality.

#### Small steps, big results

These extra little steps should only take an additional minute or two of your supervising time, but they will

free up countless hours our Membership Team spends every week reviewing and approving applications.

We're proud of our official color – medium blue – so please try to wear it during your visits! Please also make sure your ID card is visible at all times (on a badge, lanyard, neck wallet, or retractable holder). Don't forget to carry your pet's ID, too, and present it if asked. It's a privilege to represent Love on a Leash® and wearing our name helps set you and your pet apart as a pet therapy team from a recognized organization.

# NEW IN 2025 Treats

As part of our ongoing commitment to maintaining the highest standards in pet therapy, Love on a Leash® recently updated our Membership Guidelines concerning the use of treats. While we acknowledge that treats can be a great motivator during training and can enhance the joy of visits for some teams, this change aims to ensure that our visits remain focused on the pet-provided therapy we deliver during our volunteer work with our pets. Teams may kindly accept any treats offered, with the understanding that they will be saved for later, once the visit is over.

#### Why did we update this rule?

Over time, we have received multiple reports from our teams and the organizations we visit about unsafe or frustrating situations arising from the use of treats during therapy visits. We want to make it clear that this decision was not made lightly, but in response to genuine concerns raised by our community. Our goal is to prioritize the safety and well-being of our nearly 3,000 therapy teams and the thousands of visit locations we serve.

#### **Key Reasons Behind the Change:**

- Treats can lead to competitive behavior among dogs, potentially leading to unsafe situations such as dog fights or even accidents involving people.
- Many dogs have sensitive stomachs, are on special diets, or have food allergies, and using treats may exacerbate these issues
- Coaxing a dog out of their comfort zone with treats may unintentionally cause fear or defensive behaviors, which is antithetical to the goals of a therapy visit.
- Therapy dogs should not prioritize food-based rewards for performing tricks or attending a visit. While pets can be trained to perform tricks without treats, the primary goal of pet therapy visits is to provide positive
  - interactions and support through comfort rather than provide entertainment through treat-driven tricks.

    Treats can shift the focus from the people we are visiting to the handler and the dog's food.

    Attention should always be paid to the people receiving the visit, not food rewards.
    - Introducing treats can cause disinterest in visits for our dogs who are food-driven. Some dogs will lose interest in their role as therapy pets when food is introduced as the primary motivator.

While we understand that this Guideline change may take some time to adjust to, especially for pets who enjoy performing tricks for treats, we are confident that with time and additional training, this updated Guideline will ensure our therapy teams remain safe, focus, and


engaged in a way that best serves the pet-provided therapy our organization strives to deliver.

Dear Toby and your Human,

Thanks so much for reaching out with such a thoughtful question! It's heartwarming to know how much joy you and your human are bringing to others in the community and we certainly understand the appeal of having a therapy pet in the workplace.

Unfortunately, Love on a Leash® certified teams are not permitted to bring their pets to work with them under our current Guidelines. While we do offer certification and insurance that enables our teams to volunteer where we are invited, such as hospitals, schools, and nursing homes, the insurance coverage provided through Love on a Leash® does not extend to workplace environments.

Our organization is small, with fewer than 3,000 certified volunteer teams nationwide, and we focus specifically on pet therapy within the community, rather than workplace therapy programs. As such, we simply don't have the resources to certify teams for workplace visits.

That said, there are other organizations that offer specific programs and insurance for workplace pet therapy.

While we can't accommodate workplace therapy visits through Love on a Leash®, we encourage you to explore these options if your human feels strongly about having you there. We wish you all the best as you continue your great work in the community!

# **△**Chapter Spotlight: Fayetteville **△**

**Fayetteville, NC** – We're excited to shine a spotlight on our Fayetteville Chapter, a vibrant and dedicated group of pet therapy teams who have been making a positive impact in their community. Led by **Jeanne Lythgoe**, the chapter has grown steadily since it was formed in 2012 by **Judy Adams** and **Penny Johnson**. A variety of teams visit local hospitals, schools, libraries, and more. Let's take a closer look at this dynamic chapter!

A Growing Chapter with Heart – Although Jeanne wasn't the first leader of the Fayetteville Chapter, she's been instrumental in its growth and development. The chapter itself was founded by a local certified team, who is still active and engaged with the group through their Facebook page. The chapter now boasts 10 certified teams, with 2 additional teams working toward completing their supervised visits.







**Coordinating Visits with Ease** – The Fayetteville Chapter is known for its flexible scheduling and personalized approach to visits. Most visits are done individually or in small groups of 2 or 3 dogs, as teams have varied schedules. To streamline the process, Jeanne uses a Google Calendar, which all teams can access, and communication is primarily done through a group text message.

Visits include regular monthly or weekly events, as well as special one-time opportunities. Facilities often reach out to the chapter for visits, but the team is proactive in seeking new places to visit, from nursing homes to schools and VA hospitals.

**Unique Visits and Events** – One of the most heartwarming aspects of the Fayetteville Chapter is their diverse range of visits. They're regularly found at local nursing homes, libraries for children's reading programs, and community hospitals. The chapter has even participated in a student research project, where students measured the effects of pet therapy by taking vital signs before and after visits – an experience they hope to follow up on soon!

Other unique visits include their work at an adult care center for people with disabilities, as well as the pediatric mental health and cancer treatment units at the local hospital. During stressful times, the chapter also visits local colleges, where students request pet therapy for stress relief during exams.

Lastly, there's **Fred**, who has epilepsy, and his handler Jeanne carries a backpack with supplies in case of a seizure, though thankfully Fred has never had one during a visit.

What Makes Fayetteville Special? – When asked about her favorite aspect of volunteering for Love on a Leash®, Jeanne sums it up perfectly: "The joy brought to others." This sentiment resonates throughout the chapter as they continue to bring comfort, joy, and love to people of all ages and backgrounds.


