we require 10 successful, supervised visits to certify. This is often mentioned when I talk to people who are familiar with, or looking to change, their pet therapy certification. After years of being on the Love on a Leash® National Board, I am convinced that these visits are the key to successful, safe, and effective pet therapy teams. Supervised visits are a terrific way to help a team new to pet therapy gain a fuller understanding of what pet therapy really consists of, and just what facet of all the possible types of pet therapy visits will work best for them and their pet. The KEY element in that process is....All of YOU! The experience and knowledge of our Love on a Leash® teams are essential in the success of any new pet therapy team. It's where we can find out if the pet (or owner) are really a good fit, and what types of visits might work well. Often this is where we see that perhaps additional training is needed. Our Board has worked

One of the unique things about Love on a Leash® is that

with many teams who had an issue during their supervised visits, to determine what kind of additional training might help them be more successful. There have been some wonderful new teams who ran into an issue, worked on that issue with a trainer, then came back to successfully certify and visit. YOUR experience, your observations and caring, helpful mentoring of a team-intraining puts them on a successful path to volunteering in our communities, and our hope is that they will "pay it forward" and supervise new team(s) in their area. So if

you supervise new teams occasionally on your regular visits, THANK YOU!!! And if you haven't yet, please consider doing so. There is helpful information in the Guidelines for Visit Evaluators, and if you ever have a problem or question, you can always talk to your Chapter Leader, or

Guidelines in the Spotlight



Nice to meet you!

Love on a Leash® therapy teams bring comfort and joy to those they visit, but a smooth and successful visit often begins before ever stepping foot into a facility. One key element in preparing for a stress-free visit is ensuring that therapy pets meet each other beforehand.

While all Love on a Leash® pets have passed their evaluations and demonstrated excellent behavior, introducing them before a visit offers several benefits that contribute to a more positive experience for everyone involved.

- **1. Reducing Stress and Anxiety -** Therapy visits take place in a variety of settings, from hospitals to schools to senior living facilities. These environments can be new, exciting, and even overwhelming for therapy pets, especially when meeting other unfamiliar therapy animals at the same time. A pre-visit introduction allows them to become comfortable around one another in a neutral and relaxed setting, reducing potential stress on visit day.
- **2. Ensuring Positive Interactions -** Even the most well-mannered therapy pets have individual personalities. Some may be eager to interact, while others prefer their space. Meeting in advance allows handlers to observe how the pets respond to one another and ensure they are comfortable together before being placed into a working environment.

3. Creating a Cohesive Team Environment - Therapy visits are a team effort. When pets and

handlers work together harmoniously, visits are more effective and enjoyable. Pre-visit introductions help build a sense of familiarity and teamwork among pets, reducing unexpected surprises during

the visit itself.

4. Enhancing Safety and Comfort for Everyone - The safety and well-being of therapy pets, handlers, and those we visit is always the top priority. A pre-visit meeting allows handlers to recognize any signs of discomfort or overstimulation, ensuring that all therapy pets are comfortable in close proximity before entering a facility.

Ask Our Pet Panel





Dear Pet Panel,

I have a small therapy dog, Fluffy, who has always been friendly and outgoing. However, during a recent walk to a visit, we encountered an aggressive German Shepherd, and it was a terrifying experience for both of us. Since then, Fluffy has become reactive, especially when larger dogs come too close. He stiffens up, growls, and sometimes even barks at dogs he used to be fine with. I'm worried this might affect our therapy work. How can I help Fluffy regain his confidence and feel comfortable around other dogs again?

Dear Concerned Handler,

First, we're so sorry that you and Fluffy had such a frightening experience. It's completely understandable that an encounter like that could shake his confidence. As a therapy dog, it's essential for him to feel comfortable, cordial, and at least tolerant of being around other dogs. The good news is that with patience and the right approach, you can help him rebuild his confidence.

Always advocate for Fluffy. If you know he is feeling nervous around larger dogs, it's okay to politely inform other handlers during meet-and-greets that you'd prefer to keep a little distance. Avoid forcing interactions, as that can increase his anxiety.

In the meantime, here are a few things you can work on to help Fluffy feel more secure:

- Recognizing early signs of stress Watch for subtle signals like turning away, avoiding eye contact, or lip licking. These indicate discomfort before a reaction escalates.
- Creating positive associations Gradually reintroduce him to calm, well-mannered dogs at a distance where he feels safe. Reward him for calm behavior with treats or praise.
- Giving him space when needed If a situation becomes overwhelming, remove Fluffy from the encounter before he reacts. This helps prevent reinforcing fear-based responses.
- Seeking professional guidance If his reactivity continues, a certified dog trainer or veterinary behaviorist can help with targeted confidence-building exercises.

Fear-based aggression is often a response to feeling vulnerable rather than true aggression. With time, patience, and support, Fluffy can regain his confidence and continue his great work as a therapy dog. Keep advocating for him, and know that you're not alone — many therapy dogs have overcome similar challenges!



The chapter primarily conducts visits in groups of two or three, though some teams visit facilities independently, fostering strong bonds with residents. Visits span a wide variety of locations, including nursing homes, rehabilitation centers, schools, universities, libraries, airports, veterans' homes, and even private hospice care. Due to high demand, requests consistently outnumber available teams.



Therapy Tails: Dominic's Story of Love and Healing

San Diego, CA – **Dominic** came into my life when he was five years old, patiently waiting for his forever home at the San Diego Humane Society. From the moment we met, we formed an indescribable bond and I knew we had something special to do.

At the time, I was working as a mental health clinician in an outpatient psychiatry setting, providing therapy to children and families navigating behavioral challenges. A simple photo of Dominic on my desk sparked unexpected curiosity and conversations among my clients. How old is Dominic? What does he like to do? Where do you take him for walks? My client's interest in him inspired me to enroll Dominic in obedience classes, and together, we worked toward

earning his Canine Good Citizen (CGC) certification.

With his training complete, I was eager to start the process of integrating Dominic as a therapy dog at my workplace. However, I was met with heartbreak: a breed-specific policy that excluded him from being able to volunteer. Although the news was disheartening, defeat was never an invited guest in our home. I was determined to find another path. That was when I reached out to Love on a Leash®.

I still remember the moment I picked up the phone and spoke with Sue Subkow. I had tears in my eyes when she warmly reassured me, "Absolutely, we would love to have Dominic on our team. All dogs who are CGC-certified have the ability to become volunteers."

That conversation changed everything. Thanks to Love on a Leash®, Dominic was given the chance to bring smiles to those who opened their hearts to our therapy dogs. But even as I approached our training with LOAL, I noticed we still faced challenges. His appearance and breed often invited unfair judgments. Some people hesitated to visit with him, while



others made hurtful comments, assuming he was aggressive simply because of the way he looked.

Through the guidance and the supervising teams that helped us, we learned together to be patient and realized that changing deeply embedded stereotypes related to dog breeds takes a lot of time. We stayed the course and found a way to meet people with less resistance by giving Dominic glasses. The hope was that by wearing those glasses, people could see him more clearly.

For ten years, Dominic and I volunteered together, learning to navigate what we couldn't change while staying true to our mission. We wanted to share our journey becoming a pet assisted therapy team and felt inspired to write a children's book: *Therapy Tales from Dominic the Pit*.

Told through Dominic's voice, the book narrates his path to becoming a therapy dog and the challenges he faced along the way. His story reminds the world that sometimes adversity can be a powerful teacher.

To me, Dominic is my greatest love story. His velveteen face would melt any trouble away; he only happened to be wearing a pitbull outfit.



Together, we shared unforgettable moments, and through him, I grew into the person I was hoping to be. In 2024, at 16 years old, Dominic passed away as a beloved senior dog. He had love, he had joy, he had companionship, he had safety, he had life, and I was the lucky one to have him for 11 years on earth.



Bringing Comfort After the Eaton Fire

Los Angeles, CA – On March 10th, 2025, several Love on a Leash® volunteers from multiple chapters attended a very special visit to support some of the youngest victims of the recent Los Angeles fires. The effort was organized by the San Diego North County Chapter and brought together volunteers from across the region.

The group traveled 125 miles north to Altadena, where they visited neighborhoods impacted by the fires and spent meaningful time with

Saint Mark's Elementary School students who had lost both their homes and their school. These students are now attending a nearby school where they have had to quickly adapt to a new environment amidst significant emotional upheaval.

The therapy pets brought comfort, smiles, and a much-needed sense of peace to the students and staff. In such a difficult time, the presence of a gentle furry friend made a lasting difference.

Festus, a Maine Coon with a past of his own, was adopted after a farm accident left him with a disability. He spent months recovering at a veterinary clinic before Michele took him in as her companion. Together they

to many states during her years as a travel nurse, and now, Festus brings others joy through pet therapy.







Honoring Ellie – A Life Full of Love and Adventure


Ellie & Karen Otani volunteered with the Angeles Valley Foothills Chapter
